Committee:



SUNDAY MEETING

REPORT OF MEETING – AUGUST 2021

PETER MARSHALL CNZM



Retired Police Commissioner Peter Marshall took time to provide us with an enlightening and entertaining overview of his life as a New Zealand Police Officer. At age 19 he was catapulted into walking the beat around Queen Street, Karangahape Road and the Gluepot in Ponsonby - fresh out of Trentham. Quite an initiation.

Peter gave us a footprint of the New Zealand Police back to the 1960's – including an overview of the many places around the world including Sydney, Canberra, London, Washington DC, Bangkok, Jakarta, Hong Kong, Bougainville and Solomon Islands, to name but some that are represented. He spent time as Police Liaison Officer in Canberra and Washington DC. It was after 9/11 that New Zealand opened a post in Washington DC.

One of the many interesting aspects was the incidence of Police Forces in other countries. Whereas we have one organisation, the UK has 43, Australia 8 and the USA a massive 17,000 in North America. While he was in North America he lived near Arlington Cemetery and subsequently noticed there were many more commemorations there post 9/11.

In 2006 Peter applied for the role of Police Commissioner and was unsuccessful so opted to go into the Royal Solomon Islands Police Force as Police Commissioner and spent 4 years there. He said it was a fascinating country and up until 1978 was under British Jurisdiction. The Solomons consists of 9 provinces and in 1978 received independence and became self-governing. 1998 saw it go to hell in a handcart for 5 years —

essentially in civil war. Hundreds of people were killed or disappeared with heads on poles at markets.

It was a very concerning situation particularly for Australia because the Solomons are so near the top of Australia and in 2003 their Prime Minister wrote to John Howard asking for assistance. The Regional Assistance Mission to Solomon Islands (RAMSI) was formed, consisting of 15 contributing Pacific countries. RAMSI was in the Solomon Islands from 2003 until 2017.

In 2003 there were hundreds of military personnel engaged to provide high visibility to give a sense of law and order. They had many successes including seizing 3,000 firearms which they burned however it provided escape for the crocodile population which then became an issue – with 18 foot crocs roaming.

All went well until 2006 and a general election. It was a hot day with loads of people around but the man appointed was not popular and was seen as corrupt. A riot ensued and hundreds of people descended on China Town. Dozens of buildings were burnt, which caused tens of millions of dollars in damages.

Peter arrived in January 2007 about 8 months after the burning down of Chinatown and was seconded into the Solomon Islands Police Force. He was impressed with the people but the people were demoralised and the challenge was to build up their morale. He knew it would take time to build up confidence and there were various methods employed to minimise troubles. During his tenure there were five Prime Ministers.

In 1943 New Zealand troops had arrived in Guadalcanal to assist the Americans and it took 20 years to clear out the ordinances from the Solomons. There are still some hidden items and as it currently stands it will take another 20 years to clear out the remaining unexploded ordinances from Solomon Islands.

During that period Peter decided to apply for the role of Police Commissioner which required several trips back to New Zealand for interviews including an interview with the then Police Minister Judith Collins – a 6 to 7 month process until he was finally appointed.

Moving on and 2 years after retirement Peter was pushing his 12 month old grand-daughter around Mairangi Bay and was called by Minister Murray McCully wanting to talk about going to the Cook Islands which was a political appointment.

The Cook Islands proved to be an enjoyable but a very busy assignment - definitely not a holiday job. All dignitaries that visit from New Zealand want briefing notes, dinners, meetings etc which have to be organised and overseen. So he had visits from Murray McCully, Bill English, Governor General Patsy Reddy and Shane Jones who decided to get married up there and then Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern and her delegation. Each visit created about one month's work.

Peter found the Cook Islands a wonderful place in relation to people and land and a very satisfying assignment.



I DIDN'T KNOW THAT!

IAN HANDRICKS - A BUSY LIFE



Ian was born 6th July 1955 at home, 9 Farringdon St, Glen Innes, Auckland. His parents were aiming for the 4th July because 4-Square Grocers gifted a full years' worth of groceries to any child born on the 4th July, their anniversary. Ian arrived 2 days late and his sister, also planned to arrive 4th July, arrived 2 days earlier - no groceries! Ian's middle name is "Lister" named after a small temporary hospital (a converted brothel) in Gisborne where his father was born.

He went to Glen Innes Primary and Intermediate Schools and then to Selwyn College where he was placed in an accelerated class for five years and where he gained UE, Bursary and a Scholarship for Auckland University. At age 7, Ian started his first job working backstage at His Majesty's Theatre (both his parents were theatricals) - a job he kept for more than 25 years until the theatre was eventually demolished. During his teens, Ian also worked at Triang Pedigree (building pedal cars), Ultimate Echo (making electric frying pans), CRC (turning scrap metal into ingots), Kilssers Farmhouse Bakery (qualifying as a

baker), NZED (working in the Electricity Department's engineering workshops on King's Wharf), Stevens Industries (making de Witts kidney and bladder pills!) and at Edgewater College (teaching music). Ian was also very fortunate to begin working with computers in 1966 because one of his teachers had the vision and enthusiasm to begin teaching the subject at a time when there was only a couple of computers in New Zealand. He used a programming language called "PORTRAN" (Portable FORTRAN) where he created punch cards by poking out perforated holes with a pencil!

Ian began more than 48 years ago as a contact lens technician after a period of study towards an engineering degree majoring in mathematics and physics. He concentrated on lens design, mathematics of lens design, developing

production and marketing methods for the laboratory and eventually computerisation of the design and production of contact lenses. Ian completed a number of advanced management, sales and marketing courses in New Zealand and the United Kingdom.

He married a farmer's daughter from Dargaville in 1978 and his son, Daniel Logan was born in 1981. When Daniel was just 3 months old, Ian emigrated to the United Kingdom to establish and develop a large research, development and production company that introduced leading edge CNC (Computer Numerically Controlled) machining equipment for contact lens manufacture. He headed both the Computer Development Team and the International Sales and Marketing force. During this period Ian travelled extensively (more than 1 million flying miles!) selling, establishing new businesses and developing and servicing computer-based technology. A number of his inventions for the optical industry were awarded patents, many of his lens constructions are now industry standard designs.

While in the UK, Ian developed Practice Management software for Optometry and designed, built and established a number of pioneering lens production

laboratories throughout Europe, USA and Asia. While in England the family lived in a small Oxfordshire village called Chalgrove and his two daughters were born in Oxford (Helen Ruby and Eloise Adele). In 1989 Ian returned with his family to New Zealand on an invitation to re-join the Hirstlens group and immediately prepared a business plan for the future of the company. In 1990 he purchased the company expanded it rapidly and began the development of Beyond Imagination, a high technology unit for advancing photo-digital imaging as a business concept. During this period, Ian masterminded a substantial improvement in the marketing and promotion of contact lenses via innovative exhibitions.



In 1993 Ian designed and patented a highly successful bifocal contact

lens and was a key member of the engineering team that built the tooling and multi-axis lathing systems to produce the lens. This development attracted international press and television coverage. The bifocal design and subsequent engineering design was awarded a Foundation for Research, Science and Technology grant.



On 18th March 2012 Ian was awarded an Honorary Membership of the Cornea and Contact Lens Society in recognition of outstanding contribution to contact Iens practice in New Zealand. It was given for his contribution in original Iens design, patents, manufacturing inventions, substantial contributions to the mathematics of optical design, clinical contributions in Iens design for astigmatism, keratoconus, post-natal aphakia, bifocal and multifocal contact Ienses, production methodology, the development of ground breaking CNC manufacturing optics, surface engineering, materials research, robotics, practice management software and for the introduction of computers into the whole New Zealand optometry market.

In 1994 he began work on innovative software and business model for a photographic restoration system called Photopages. He has managed the engineering, development, sales and marketing teams of this project since its inception. During 1999 Ian developed the franchise in the United Kingdom and completed the franchise package including authoring the manuals and support marketing material. The growth of the photo restoration business was rapid and in 2002 a landmark sales and distribution agreement was signed with Creekside LLC in USA. Ian established large computer studios in New Zealand, China and India using his software and techniques to service the growing market developing in the USA. Walgreens, Walmart, CVS, Albertsons, Best Buy and many other major chains now use this photo restoration service exclusively. Further distribution agreements were completed for Japan, Asia and Europe and PhotoWonder is now the world's largest photo restoration company.

In 2003, lan began work on Tooth-pix, a professional imaging service providing a comprehensive yet simple method for dental photos to be altered to show predictive outcomes for cosmetic surgery. Ian pioneered the manipulation software and techniques for Tooth-pix and has worked closely with key dentists in NZ to develop a professional on-line interface for all dentistry.

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2004 saw the release of lan's unique real estate system, Realty-Pix. Similar to Tooth-pix, it provided the opportunity for property buyers to explore the potential of a property prior to investment, encouragement for vendors to better prepare the property for sale and can inexpensively explore make-over options when considering planned home improvements. Ian has worked closely with key people within the real estate industry to advance the use of more effective marketing techniques.

lan also is actively involved with and collaborates in developing complete business solutions, designing and building comprehensive internet and engineering complex software solutions for a wide range of commercial disciplines. These have included web-sites for publishing houses, software for asset management systems, high profile sites for automotive dealerships and real estate listing sites. In 2009 he developed a complete business plan and infrastructure to support real estate sales by lawyers.



In 2011, Ian was appointed as a foundation director of Alexander & Co.Ltd., a leading surveying company in New Zealand specializing in building enclosures and providing market leading solutions, advice and assistance in all aspects of building surveying, dispute resolution, cladding design, architecture, maintenance planning and building restoration. He is also a consultant with company providing management, training, business development and career development services.

In 2014 Ian established NUON, a boutique innovation group which specialises in providing economic IT, graphics and web solutions. He also provides management, writing and marketing support for a number of financial advisors. Also that year Ian began working with a high profile provincial newspaper supporting business growth and providing editorial and graphic design services. He has also designed and is delivering a marketing plan for a radiology enterprise based at Ascot Central in Auckland.

From 2014 Ian has provided business management training, marketing support and high-level coaching for a number of companies over a diverse scope of disciplines. These include insurance brokers, style and fashion consultants, cartoonists and animators, IT support enterprises, optometrists, dental practices, counsellors and psychotherapists, mortgage brokers, accountants, software support and developers, NLP practitioners, authors and writers, social media experts, restaurateurs, marketing companies and artographers. In supporting these businesses, he has, for them, created a large number of websites and has provided graphics and design services.





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TEKZONE TIPS

HOW TO CREATE KEYBOARD SHORTCUTS FOR PROGRAMS IN WIN 10!

Any time you open a Windows app by using mouse pointer over to an icon or lift your finger up and tapping on an icon, you're wasting time and putting unnecessary strain on your shoulder. The fastest and least physically way to launch any program is with a keyboard shortcut. Windows 10 allows you to create custom shortcuts for any program, whether it's a traditional "desktop" app, a new-fangled "universal app" or one of Windows 8's "metro apps." Here's how.

Create Program Shortcut Key

- 1. Open a command prompt window. You can get there by typing "cmd" into the Cortana / Search box and then right clicking on Command Prompt and selecting "Run as administrator."
- 2. Type "explorer shell:AppsFolder" (without quotes) at the command prompt and hit Enter. A window with a list of all your apps appears.
- 3. Right click on an app and select Create shortcut. It may be easier to find your app if you change the view setting to "detailed list" so you can see all the icons in a single column.
- 4. Click Yes when asked if you want the shortcut on the desktop. A new shortcut icon appears on your desktop.
- 5. Right click on the new shortcut icon and select Properties.
- 6. Enter a key combination in the Shortcut key field. The combination must be CTRL + ALT + a letter / number. You can also use replace CTRL or ALFT with SHIFT
- 7. Click OK. That's it. You can create Keyboard Short Cut on your most frequently use program so you don't need to look for it just press combination key you set to start it. Note: Remember not to use the same key combination twice. Also note that some programs use CTRL + ALT + keyboard shortcuts that would also launch if you were in their windows. For example, in Photoshop Elements, CTRL + ALT + I bring up the resize menu.


